Dear Sir.

Having tried five times over the past week to contact the "Planning Applications Web Site" and been told each time that:- "We are sorry, but the service you require has been interrupted by a Technical Fault" I have resorted to the old fashioned letter!

Proposed Housing Developments off Red Lane, Appleton. (R18/105, R18/003)

Red Lane is congested as things stand at the moment, often used as a bypass by traffic from the West (A56) wishing to avoid Stockton Heath to gain access to the A49 Southbound and vice versa.

It is also heavily used during school times by traffic bringing and collecting children to and from Broomfield Schools, also by those walking. A safety concern.

The additional housing in Field Lane added traffic to an already busy Red Lane.

Red Lane Bridge was built in the days of horses and carts; it is narrow, has a weight restriction and in Winter the "Northern steeper Approach" can be very icy. There have been several "shunts."

Red Lane is itself steep and has two "Pinch Points" One guarded by "Give Way to Oncoming Traffic" sign, often ignored and within it a blind junction with Birchdale Road controlled by a mirror. The other bounded on one side by a high sandstone wall and on the other by paths from housing leading directly onto the Road.

Can this lane cope with additional traffic?

The Bridleway/ Footpath a local amenity used by walkers, cyclists, children and horse riders wishing to escape the urban sprawl and, forming part of the Delamere Way will this disappear surrounded by housing?

Will the proposed housing access onto Red Lane with yet another junction or will it join Hough Lane, again a road not suitable for additional traffic?

Some time ago a pipe leading from the Reservoir on Firs Lane fractured above Hillside Farm, sending gallons of water and stone into the yard of the farm below: is it a good idea to build housing below the reservoir with the potential for this to happen again? I think not.

Red Lane joins on its North Side, Whitefield Road at the junction with Belvoir Road and Westbourne Road: Whitefield Road often already congested by parked cars on both sides of the carriage way.

All this development throws yet more traffic Northbound onto the three swing bridges and the weight restricted Cantilever Bridge.
