


Dear Sirs,

I write to voice my great concern over the proposed 'Main Road' along the route of the Railway Embankment through Latchford, Grappenhall and Thelwall. Although I recognise the need for new housing I feel brown field sites must be developed rather than reducing our precious green belt. Naturally more housing will put excessive pressure on drainage and increase the risk of flooding. New sewers may be constructed but these will no doubt link up to existing ones which would struggle to cope. Thelwall is an area which has already flooded and residents would be left living with an increased fear of this occurring again with worse consequences.

The proposed loss of part of the Pennine Trail to accommodate a road is something I strongly object to.



The trail is continually used and enjoyed by dog walkers, like myself but also cyclists, runners and walking groups and at this time when mental health and increased worries of obesity are being flagged up to us all and promoted by the government it is somewhat contradictory that an area which promotes escape from life's pressures and an opportunity to enjoy nature in a peaceful environment is to be taken from us.

The impact on nature would be immense as many birds and animals would lose their habitats.
