The sheer scale of the residential development in the proposed Garden Suburb seems excessive and cannot be achieved without fundamentally changing the character of Appleton and Stretton. As I understand it, possible development in the villages in North Warrington was rejected on the grounds that it was important to retain their character. Whilst obviously agreeing that this is desirable it is difficult to understand why similar consideration cannot be given to similar areas in South Warrington.

Since living here, we have been very impressed with the brownfield developments that have taken place and would commend the Council and developers for all they have achieved in this respect. We appreciate that Central Government policy has an impact on the Council's approach to these matters but would simply appeal to those who will make the final decisions to consider "spreading the load" more equitably between areas in the North and South of the borough and hope that the wonderful asset that Warrington has in its surrounding semi-rural areas is not lost forever!
