<p>1. <u>Welcome and Introductions</u></p> <p>Cllr Tony Higgins welcomed everybody to the meeting and noted apologies (see attendee list below).</p>

<p>4. <u>C6 Community Forum update and planned activity</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • DA mentioned that there is a new chair of the community forum as Cllr. Flaherty has had to resign as chair as she was to take up the role of mayor • Cllr. Fitzpatrick has taken the role of chair. • Recently the forum had their first in person meeting after Covid and were continuing to listen to the community, keep them informed and were looking to support local community groups. • JT asked on behalf of Barbara Parratt about contact details for the community forum so she could promote in WBC community buildings <p>Action – DA to come back with the right contact for BP</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • VP has spoken to DMc about the travel issues for people in Bewsey and Whitecross at the workshop. DMc replied that he had spoken to Ben Waverley from Warrington Bus company about a pass subscription for young people to access the new youth zone • AA asked DMc to also include young people in care and care leavers. 	

<p>5. <u>Youth Zone</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • DMc gave an update presentation about the Youth Zone • DMC explained that he is working with AA to make sure that all underrepresented groups are being catered for at the Youth Zone. • GJ asked if it was possible for Torus neighbourhood teams who work with families could have drop in access to the Youth Zone, GJ also if there would be a system for referrals to agencies across Warrington. <p>Action – GJ and DMC to discuss drop in and referral systems outside of the meeting.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • GJ asked in membership fees would be another barrier for access to young people, DMc explained that the membership fees are only 7% of what income they receive. GJ thought that a bursary would be a good idea for those who could not afford the membership, • next C6 meeting to take place at the Youth Zone <p>Action – GD to arrange next C6 meeting at the Youth Zone</p>	
<p>6. <u>Town Deal: Wellbeing hub</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • LG and SB gave a presentation about the new Wellbeing Hub, • SP explained that WBC asked for 26.7m from the government from the Town Deal fund but were only allocated 22.1m, but had received 5M from the Get Building Fund. Shortfalls were being picked up from the council. • GJ asked how the hub would share with resident’s pathways/ referrals to the service, SB talked about how they are developing the service to develop pathways that help people are offered the right pathway from the start. • LG reiterated that the pathways will developed over the 12 months with services. • DMc talked about the issues for families getting into town centre and parking issues especially with bus lane restrictions at the end of town were the hub is situated. He also asked that the offer included children services with a demographic for all. • DB responded to the bus lane issue with assurance that the bus lane is well signposted with clear signs to encourage people not to drive in that area as there was not a lot of parking available. • AA asked for integrated care to be represented so that both adults and children can access the service. • SB mentioned the need to settle on a brand to be able to market the hub for everyone with a plan to have a conversation with the public. AC conscious of agreeing a living well agenda but there is a need for branding that does not confuse the public.
