Summary and key findings

Survey process and feedback

This chapter sets out a summary of key results obtained from the final survey conducted in Spring 2023 in order to understand public views on the Westy Low Traffic Neighbourhood (LTN) scheme implemented in June 2022. The below sets out key dates and responses received.

The final survey ran from Monday 24th April to Monday 22nd May 2023. The survey was advertised through the following:

- Letter drop to residents on 24th April 2023
- Central 6 website's update and banner advertising the survey on 24th April 2023
- Warrington Borough Council Facebook page survey added on 24th April 2023

A total of 1,144 surveys were submitted via the online questionnaire and mailed paper surveys. The responses set were formed by:

- o 29% responses from the Westy LTN residents
- o 33% responses from residents outside of the LTN but nearby
- 19% responses from frequent visitors to the LTN area
- 14% responses from people frequently passing through the LTN area
- o 4% from people occasionally visiting or passing through
- 1% from people with no remaining connections to Westy

329 surveys were submitted from residents within the LTN area, accounting for 19%¹ of the adult Westy LTN population. All respondents declaring to be residents within the LTN stated their preference between making the scheme permanent or removing it.

Westy LTN - June 2022

Figure 1 illustrates the Westy LTN as implemented in June 2022. The 'modal filters' initially implemented across the Westy area were at the following locations:

- Grange Avenue, south of the junction with Westy Lane
- Griffiths Street, south of the junction with Westy Lane
- · Griffiths Street, south of the junction with Broadbent Avenue
- Reynolds Street, east of the junction with Tinsley Street

Modal filters are effectively point closures that restrict vehicular traffic from accessing a particular street. Access into and out of the area around Street Augustine's Primary School was maintained from Lindley Avenue, Hensall Avenue and Broadbent Avenue. The one-way restriction on Broadbent Avenue was reversed (to be westbound), to aid access into this area.

Access to the area around Alderman Bolton Community Primary School was maintained from Grange Avenue, Reynolds Street and exit via Longdin Street.

Westy November 2022

An interim survey was undertaken in Summer 2022 to gather public feedback on the Westy scheme. Several issues were identified through that feedback, including:

- Some increases in access traffic and increased speeds on residential streets
- Challenges accessing homes in the Griffiths Street and Reynolds Street areas
- Difficulties operating the lockable bollard on Reynolds Street, to provide access for school trips
- The survey findings informed a review of the LTN. This review was informed by email comments sent to the Council over the life of the scheme and the monitoring of changes to traffic patterns.

To address the concerns identified above and improve the scheme, as of 3rd November 2022, the following changes were made and are also shown in Figure 2:

- Remove the planters at the north end of Griffiths Street. This will improve access to homes in this area.
- Remove the bollard on Reynolds Street and extend the one-way to the planters. This will relieve pressure on Longdin St and allow coaches to pick up from the schools unhindered.
- Restore Broadbent Avenue to two-way traffic, between Griffiths St and Davies Ave. To
 return this section of road to its previous arrangement and improve access to homes in this
 area.

The survey results presented in this report were provided in response to this layout.

Preferred Option: make the LTN Permanent versus Remove the LTN Feedback from All Respondents




Figure 3 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – LTN Preferred Option - All Respondents

The preferred option for the LTN scheme future, from all respondents, is shown in Figure 3 below with 7% of respondents wishing to make the LTN permanent and 93% wishing to remove the LTN features completely. This includes all respondents to the survey including Westy LTN residents and respondents visiting, passing by or living nearby the LTN area.

Preferred Option: Make the LTN Permanent versus Remove the LTN Feedback from Westy LTN Residents Only




Figure 4 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – LTN Preferred Option – Westy LTN Residents

The level of support expressed by Westy LTN residents is shown in Figure 4 below with 18% of respondents wishing to make the LTN permanent and 82% wishing to remove the LTN features completely. This includes all respondents declaring to live within the LTN area.

Cameras Option

Feedback from All Respondents




Figure 5 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 - Cameras Option - All Respondents

The level of support towards the cameras option from all respondents is shown in Figure 5 below with 12% in support of the cameras enforcement alternative and 88% opposing. This includes all respondents to the survey including Westy LTN residents and respondents visiting, passing by or living nearby the LTN area. 13 of the surveys submitted by post did not express a preference.

Cameras Option

Feedback from Westy LTN Residents Only




Figure 6 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Cameras Option – Westy LTN Residents

The level of support expressed by Westy LTN residents is shown in Figure 6 below with 17% in support of the cameras enforcement alternative and 83% opposing. 9 of the surveys submitted by post did not express a preference.

Level of Support to the LTN:

Westy LTN residents response rate Vs whole area population




Figure 7 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Response Rate of Westy LTN Population

Figure 7 shows the proportion of respondents within the LTN area who stated their level of support towards the scheme, compared to the number of adults who have not responded. This suggests that 81% of adults residing within the LTN area have not stated their level of support or opposition to the scheme.

At the time of recording, Westy population was reported to be made up of:

- 1,896 residents in total;
- An adult population (over 16) of 1,719; and
- 973 households within the LTN.

Resident population numbers have been derived from the Office for National Statistics (ONS) midyear population estimates, for 2020.

Appendix A – Survey Methodology

Westy Final Survey - Spring 2023

This report presents the result of the final Westy Low Traffic Neighbourhood (LTN) survey held between Monday 24th April to Monday 22nd May 2023. The purpose of the final survey was to give people a chance to express their support towards making the LTN permanent, alter the scheme, or removing it.

Public consultation details, including links to the final survey and email contact to request accessible copies of the materials, were publicised through a letter drop carried out in the neighbourhood. The survey was also advertised on the Central 6 Plan website and via Warrington Borough Council (WBC) Social Media channels.

Methodology

The final survey was first advertised in Westy Newsletter published and delivered to residents and businesses in March 2023. A letter drop was then delivered within Westy on the 24th April including:

- Link to the final survey and QR code
- Email contact to request paper, large print or alternative format copies of the survey
- The addresses of two locations where paper copies could be picked up (Westy's Children Centre and Westy Community Centre)

A reminder of the survey being open, encouraging the public to submit feedback, was published via the official Warrington Borough Council Facebook page on the 30th of August (Figure 8).

All the materials shared through the final survey were uploaded to the WBC website www.warrington.gov.uk/central 6 streetsPlan

Blank surveys have not been included in the data presented in this report's analysis. Incomplete (partial responses) have been included.

Please note the final surveys were fully anonymous and none of the data provided can be used to identify respondents individually. Providing postcodes and contact details was optional and with the only purpose to help us better understand where specific issues are arising.

Appendix B – Detailed Survey Results to All Questions

Survey Results

In this chapter, the survey results are presented through responses to each question. The analysis of the level of support is then further broken down by age, gender, disability and residency groups. Please note that while none of the provided responses to the survey allowed for identifying individuals, the following questions have been omitted from the public-facing report in order to reinforce the anonymity of the survey and ensure compliance with Data Protection regulations:

- Q1.a: home postcode;
- Q1.b: home street names




Figure 10 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Age




Figure 11 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 - Gender




Figure 12 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Health Problem or Disability

733 respondents (64%) chose not to answer equality monitoring questions. Of the 411 respondents providing demographic information 68% were aged 35-64, with 1.5% being under 25 and 16% being over 65. The group is split into 63% of respondents identifying as women, 34% as men and 3% prefer not to say. Out of all respondents, 29% consider themselves to have a health problem or disability Figure 10, Figure 11, and Figure 12 illustrate the key demographics of the survey respondents.

Age

Of the respondents disclosing their age range, 39% were over 55 years old, 57% were between 25-54 and 4% were under 24.

Gender

Of the respondents disclosing their gender 34% was male and 63% female – with 3% preferring not to say.

Are your day-to-day activities limited because of a health problem or disability which has lasted, or is expected to last, at least 12 months?

Of the respondents disclosing their disability status 29% declared to have health problems or disabilities impacting their day-to-day activities while 64% did not and 7% preferred not to say.

Q2. How do you describe your connection to the Westy area?




Figure 13 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Connection To The Area

Out of the 1144 surveys submitted, 329 (29%) respondents declared to live within Westy LTN boundaries – this accounts for 19% of the overall adult population within the study area. 805 (70%) respondents declared to live nearby, visiting or passing through the LTN, and 7 declared to have no connection to Westy at all – the full breakdown of the respondents' group is shown in Figure 13 below:

Q3. As a visitor or someone who passes through the Westy LTN area - What is your usual journey purpose?

Out of the respondents visiting or frequently passing through the LTN area, 22% travelled to Westy to visit family and friends and 18% as part of their journey to work. The full breakdown of journey purposes is shown in Figure 13 below. 30% of respondents indicated multiple journey purposes.




Figure 14 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 - Visitors And Passing Through Journey Purpose

Q5. Whilst the LTN Trial has been in place, have you changed your travel patterns compared to before the scheme was in place?

After the LTN implementation, the majority (79%) of respondents declared to have changed their travel patterns in some way, with 6% of them not visiting the area at all anymore. The full breakdown of the travel changes are shown in below:




Figure 15 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 - Changed Travel Patterns

Q8. Westy LTN - Which is your preferred option?

Respondents were given the choice of two options:

- Option 1 Make the scheme permanent. The current LTN trial would be made permanent, and the existing temporary planters upgraded to more permanent features. These features would be designed in close consultation with residents.
- Option 2 Remove the LTN features completely. The existing temporary planters would be removed, and one-way systems reverted to the original arrangements. This would mean all traffic is returned to Grange Avenue, Griffith Street and Reynolds Street.

All respondents




Figure 16 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Level Of Support - All Respondents

Figure 16 shows the overall degree of support expressed by all respondents – this accounts for 93% preferring to remove the LTN features completely, and 7% wishing to make the scheme permanent. One respondent commented they were not sure.




Figure 17 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Level Of Support – Westy LTN Residents




Figure 18 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Level Of Support for LTN – Residents Nearby of the LTN




Figure 19 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Level Of Support for LTN – Over 65s




Figure 20 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Level Of Support for LTN – Under 65s




Figure 21 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Level Of Support for LTN – Males




Figure 22 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Level Of Support for LTN – Females




Figure 23 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Level Of Support for LTN – With Disability or Health Problem




Figure 24 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Level Of Support for LTN – Without Disability or Health Problem

Q9. What if there was another option? Using cameras to reduce through traffic

Respondents were given the choice to support or oppose the use of cameras instead of physical barriers while retaining unrestricted and unlimited access to roads within Westy in the future for residents.




Figure 25 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Level Of Support for Cameras – All Respondents

Figure 25 shows support expressed by all respondents for the use of cameras instead of physical barriers. 89% oppose the future use, and 11% support the use. One respondent commented they were not sure.

Pages to follow show a breakdown of questions 8 and 9 by respondents' residency, connection to the area, respondents' age, gender and disability. This allows us to explore how different groups within the community experience the current LTN scheme.

53 respondents who wish to make the LTN permanent oppose the use of cameras. This makes up for 69% of people who selected Option 1.

102 respondents who chose Option 2 for the previous question, to remove the LTN completely, are in support of cameras. This makes up for around 10% of people who wish to remove the LTN.




Figure 26 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 - Level Of Support for Cameras - Westy LTN Residents




Figure 27 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Level Of Support for Cameras – Residents Nearby of the LTN




Figure 28 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Level Of Support for Cameras – Over 65s




Figure 29 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Level Of Support for Cameras – Under 65s




Figure 30 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Level Of Support for Cameras – Males




Figure 31 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Level Of Support for Cameras – Females




Figure 32 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Level Of Support for LTN – With Disability or Health Problem




Figure 33 Westy Final Survey Spring 2023 – Level Of Support for LTN – Without Disability or Health Problem
